What is Lent?

The season of Lent is well and truly upon us. Growing up, I would often hear school friends saying that they were giving up chocolate for Lent and wondered why that was. In particular, at that time, I wondered what Lent was all about, and why chocolate?

Fast forward several years and training to become a vicar in the Church of England continues to deepen my engagement with Lent. Lent is the 40

day period observed from Ash Wednesday right up until Easter. These 40 days reflect the 40 days that Jesus abstained from food, fasting in the desert, a very testing time during which he was tempted by the devil. Lent allows us to reflect on these events leading up to the death of Christ and his resurrection.

Giving up something, or abstaining for a period of time from something one enjoys, for example chocolate or sweets is a sign of sacrifice and self-discipline helping us to acknowledge and remember the sacrifice that Jesus made and his exemplary self-discipline in truly testing times. Whatever one chooses to abstain from during Lent is a personal choice, for example in recent times, I've known people to abstain from social media, the television and even complaining!

Rather than giving things up, I've also known people to take up a new habit for Lent including exercise, prayer, expressing gratitude, being kinder, helping out more at home, and donating to charity.

Although Lent has already begun, it is never too late to join in the Spirit of Lent; to reflect on one's life choices to date, and to make those adjustments that help us to go forward in a more Christ like manner. So whether you decide to give up something, take up something new, or none of these aforementioned things, I hope that this season of Lent becomes a season of reflection, of Christ's peace and points the way to the hope of resurrection that Easter brings.

Bishop Christopher's Lent Call 2021



The Challenge of Face Masks for those with Hearing Loss

Face masks, shields, social distancing and plastic barriers as seen at checkout tills in supermarkets muffle or reduce sound, but they are there to protect us during the pandemic. Face masks can also make people with hearing loss feel isolated and anxious, especially for individuals who very much rely on lip reading. By now, nearly all of us, even those with normal hearing, have had to ask a person with a mask to repeat themselves or to speak up. So, how do we cope?

If you have hearing loss, asking someone to speak up may not help. Louder speech bordering on shouting can actually hurt your ears, so instead, it is helpful to know how to adjust hearing aids for noisy environments like supermarkets. If you wear behindthe-ear hearing aids, you may encounter problems trying to wear a mask



hearing aids and glasses. These little plastic or fabric devices can be attached to the face mask straps across the back of the head, instead of resting over the ear.

To improve communication if you have a hearing loss, try the following tips:

- Acknowledge that the situation will be tricky, but you will get there. Try to feel confident and then you will cope more easily.
- Firstly, ask the person if they can hear you too. Remember everybody has a few difficulties at the moment, especially in a noisy environment.
- Think what you need to ask/say beforehand and speak slowly and clearly.
- If you need to tell someone you have hearing loss, think of a phrase that might help, e.g. 'I wear hearing aids; please can you speak a bit more slowly? That really helps me to understand you.'
- Or: 'I am guite deaf; please can you lower your mask so I can lip-read?'
- When speaking to someone with hearing loss, speak slowly and clearly. Do not shout or walk away while speaking.
- If you are not understood, try to rephrase what you said with different words. Gestures and body language all help, and there is always pen and paper or apps for 'speech to text' such as Google Live Transcribe for mobile phones.
- For doctors or hospital appointments, you can request support according to need and always get the information in writing.

Finally, do smile! I think we have all learnt how to recognise when someone is smiling even from behind their face mask. Helen Akers

A Wildlife Garden (Part 1) I am sure that, as we have been in lockdown since

the beginning of the year, some of us have been noticing the birds and other wildlife as we take our daily exercise in our lovely local area. Some people are not able to do that, though, especially in the winter weather. Many local residents have probably therefore taken extra enjoyment from the birds in their garden. We won't have been doing much actual gardening but some of the birds have been doing it for us, tossing leaves and other debris around and disturbing the soil while they hunt for what little food may be around.

If you have a bird feeder in a place you can easily see from your armchair you can expect to see a variety of small birds there, such as blue tits, great tits, coal tits, house sparrows, chaffinches, greenfinches and perhaps great spotted woodpeckers, nuthatches and long-tailed tits if you are lucky. On the ground or perched on branches will be robins, blackbirds, song thrushes, magpies, dunnocks, woodpigeons and collared doves. I have also recently had regular visits from pheasants which are happy to hoover up seeds dropped from the feeder by the smaller birds. It may surprise you to know that some of 'our' blackbirds and robins are actually winter visitors from other parts of Europe where it is much colder than here. If you are particularly lucky you may have a visit from what we call 'winter thrushes' - the beautiful redwing or (less likely in a garden) a fieldfare. These are more likely to come in very cold, snowy weather like we had recently as they find it difficult to find food elsewhere. These days you may well also see the odd red kite or buzzard flying over as they are becoming more common in our area.

You will definitely see more garden birds if you feed them. Peanuts, mixed seeds, sunflower hearts and fat balls are, of course, favourites. I also love to see robins, blackbirds and the occasional pied wagtail on my patio where I scatter dried mealworms for them. And, very important, don't forget to make sure there is water available for them to drink (not frozen solid!). Happy armchair birdwatching! Barbara Richards

Driving down from Durham on a cold December night in 1979. David and I wondered what our new house would be like - a tied cottage that went with my husband's job. We were so pleased to have a house with two indoor toilets, after a small flat with a 'nettie' in the yard that froze up in winter! But the thing that pleased us most was a very large garden.

Within months our garden was full of vegetables, hens and Springer spaniels. David came back from the family farm with a very handsome and friendly cockerel we called George, and four hens we named Biddy, Edna, Mavis and Brownie. Gradually the flock increased to 25, mainly little 'ginger jobs' who were superb layers - we had a waiting list of customers!

Over the years our animal family increased because we gave a home to unwanted animals: two Aylesbury ducks, two rabbits, a tortoise and five

Spaniels, although not at the same time! We never 🐝 needed to use insecticides to protect our vegetables as our hens cleared the pests. Their favourite place to have a dust bath was in the courgette plants.

One permanent fixture in the garden was a Bramley apple tree which I know for a fact was planted on 3 September 1939. It survived the Great Storm of 1987 and still produces a magnificent display of blossom and lots of apples. Nothing stays the same for ever - we lost our hens to a fox who got into the henhouse through a tiny gap; we never replaced them. *Suzanne Hill, Old Oxted*

ESW operates within the Ramblers Association, comprising some 500 local walking groups and 107,000 members. Walking in the countryside became popular during the 19th century, offering, for many people living in towns and cities, a welcome escape from pollution and hard working lives. Landowners began to restrict and close access using the Enclosure Movement. From the mid-nineteenth century to the 1930s, walking clubs and groups started to form and campaign for walkers' rights and in 1931, walkers from all over Britain

joined to create the National Council of Ramblers Federations. The following year, 400 walkers took part in a 'mass trespass' at Kinder Scout which became a landmark event in progressing rights and access to land.

The Ramblers Association was officially created on 1 January 1935 and over the years has grown significantly, continuing to campaign and to promote walking as an easy, accessible form of exercise. Stephen Hanks, (ESW Publicity Officer)
